Check out the RSCDS Website

I wonder how many members have spent time exploring the information and dance resources available on the main RSCDS website which is a membership benefit that we can all take advantage of. If like me you sometimes find yourself wasting time scrolling through some mindless rubbish on the internet, I would recommend the RSCDS website as a far more interesting browsing experience. If you are new to Scottish dancing, as I was, you can find out all sorts of things but there is even information for experienced dancers and resources for teachers

Go to rscds.org and click on Learn or follow the link from our branch site.

Information is extensive but well organised and accessible. Some of the things you find include a basic beginners guide to steps, foot positions and descriptions of common terminology, which isn't always obvious to newbies. For example, what is top and bottom? Which corners are which?

There is a very useful and comprehensive section on formations with short individual videos to illustrate each one.

I was especially interested in the section on Scottish dance music which describes the three principal rhythm types, jig, reel and strathspey, (plus march and waltz time). There is information on the origins of the tune genres and each section includes snippets of typical examples so you can start to hear and understand the different rhythms, structures and sequences and how they fit the dance.

Would definitely recommend a look at the RSCDS site and unlike many websites no annoying adverts or pop ups!



Report of the Autumn Gathering & AGM Weekend

7th – 8th November 2025



This year saw the return of the Autumn Gathering to the Kelvin Hall in Glasgow. The City is celebrating 850 years since becoming a Burgh and this was evident by buildings being lit up at night and the lovely frieze made by local school children and on display at our AGM.



The dance programme for the Friday night was chosen by the San Francisco Branch and we danced to the music of Susan MacFadyen and her Scottish Country Dance Band. The first dance was 'The Shetland Shepherdess', and I just happened to be standing next to her in the line up! Caroline Nicol is a Shetlander, shepherding in Norway, whom the deviser met during a visit to Oslo.

On Saturday morning we were up bright and early for an opportunity to meet with the Board Members. I was particularly interested to talk about the new RSCDS Strategy and how Branches might become involved. We were advised that guidance and a Toolkit will be available on the new Website which should be up and running in the New Year.

The 96th AGM was held during the afternoon and President, Gary Coull, gave an inspirational address.

There was a special connection for us as the teacher taking the course was Faye O'Neil (formerly Mather) who learned to dance here in Wirral as a child, taught by Margaret Kay. Margaret would have been very proud of her protégé as Faye is not only a beautiful dancer, but an excellent teacher!

We all 'upped our game' especially when Faye reminded us that we were falling into the common trap of performing steps beautifully in step practice but then not transferring our improvements into our dancing when we were doing an entire dance.



We tackled some little-known dances that demanded real concentration to achieve slight variations on formations we know well.

A good example was the Ruby Hornpipe where we had to do an inverted allemande followed by setting on the right foot only and six slip steps to the left before turning partner with the right hand. (It works but you do have to keep thinking) https://youtu.be/rwWAjFBxdJ8?si=KYT7SYqUULp6 y1ol

Faye challenged us with good humour, patience and a smile and we dancers responded with our very best efforts.
